

Hawaii Statehood Day

Sixty years ago, on August 21, 1959, Hawaii was admitted as the 50th U.S. state. Here in Hawaii, Statehood Day (or Admission Day) is celebrated annually on the third Friday in August. So today, August 16, is a state holiday. The school year started on August 5, but today there is NO SCHOOL!

If our state flag looks a bit familiar, that's most likely because it has the Union Flag of the United Kingdom in the upper left corner. King Kamehameha I commissioned the Hawaiian



flag in 1816. The Union Jack was included to honor Hawaii's friendship with the British. The eight white, red, and blue stripes symbolize the eight major islands: Hawai'i, Maui, O'ahu, Kaua'i, Moloka'i, Lana'i, Ni'ihau, and Kahol'olawe.
